Grant Funds Recreation Activities

Amsterdam - In early fall, a festival was held at St. Mary's Institute in Amsterdam for children who participate in Liberty's after-school, recess and summer recreation programs. Approximately 20 children, along with their family members, were treated to interactive games, face painting, pumpkin decorating and a fun bounce house. For adults who are involved with the Family Support Program a Halloween dance was held at the Perthshire Resort. The dance, which was attended by 31 participants, included a DJ, food and treats for all.

Both of these events were made possible through a grant by NYSARC, Liberty's parent agency. The Trustees of the NYSARC Trusts provided Liberty with a \$6,000 grant to support recreational opportunities for program individuals. The NYSARC Trusts administer supplemental needs trusts that enable people who have disabilities to remain in their home and community and retain their Medicaid eligible services. The Trustees utilize remainder funds to benefit other persons with disabilities including unfunded Chapter guardianship programs as provided by statue. In addition to the recreation grant, the Trustees awarded \$1,225,500 to support Chapter Guardianship programs.
