In combination with Manufacturing, Vocational Rehabilitation, and Sub-Assembly, Liberty provided our individuals with paying jobs to accumulate over 73,408 hours worked. Congratulations!

Some of the new relationships we began in 2013 include Breton Industries of Amsterdam, NY, Taylor Made Products in Johnstown, NY, and Richardson's in Canajoharie, NY. *]ust a reminder...

- The agency's insurance plan year now runs July through June. The next open enrollment period when you can make plan changes, additions, enroll in vision, or enroll in a Flexible Spending Plan will not be until May, 2014, with a July 1, 2014, effective date.
- Effective January 1, 2014, Liberty will be switching our Life Insurance carrier for employees from Standard Insurance to Hartford Life Insurance Company. Hartford is currently the agency's carrier for Long Term Disability coverage. You will not be required to complete a new beneficiary form as Hartford has agreed to accept any enrollment forms we currently have on file if a claim is ever made. Supplemental coverage rates will remain as they currently are. For those of you already enrolled, this will be a seamless transition.

Safety Corner

"Safety Culture"

I t's hard to believe another year has passed, as we look forward to beginning 2014 and wonder, "Where did 2013 go?"

It certainly was a year chock full of new experiences, policy and procedure changes, new people, and, of course, new rules and regulations from all over! At Liberty, the New Year promises to bring everyone more opportunities to adapt to change.

Regardless of your job title at Liberty, each person here plays a critical role in the development of what we call the "culture" of the agency. Safety professionals often refer to a "safety culture" at companies in which employees are engaged and motivated to participate and mentor safe behaviors, leading to fewer accidents and injuries.

The definition of the word "culture" includes a group having shared values, practices, beliefs, and attitudes. It's making sure everyone is working towards the same goal.

Our agency Skill Based Training (SBT) program was developed specifically to ensure that skills taught in the training classroom were observed and supported by veteran staff, who become mentors for new hires. The "One Team, One Goal" slogan certainly applies to safety and safety training. Many people will have opportunities to mentor new staff, as well as to help each other in daily activities. Whether we are reviewing an agency vehicle inspection record, completing an SBT, or reviewing a fire evacuation plan, each person has opportunities to shape our agency safety culture by providing assistance and guidance to someone else.

Be the change you want to see means that we need to exemplify the good we want to see in others. Take time to show someone how, discuss why, and communicate questions and concerns openly and honestly. As a leader, follow up on questions and listen. If you don't have an answer, be honest and try to get one. Provide the "why."

With these changes, we can be a little closer to developing that "safety culture" in 2014!
