Downtown survey seeks input from city businesses

The Gloversville Downtown Development Specialist (GDDS) Office at Fulton County Center for Regional Growth (CRG) is asking Gloversville businesses to take a brief online survey.

“The representatives and various BID (Business Improvement District) leaders for downtowns across the state are meeting in person in

ARC New York February phone blitz sends powerful message to state leaders

Disability advocates in the Capitol Region, including in Montgomery County, sent a powerful message to state leaders about the critical need for investment in supports and services for New Yorkers with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD). A February Phone Blitz held by Northeast Region Chapters of The Arc New York, which Liberty ARC participated in, saw an incredible response with over 2,000 calls from engaged community members in a single week.

The calls urged State Representatives to support the inclusion of a 3.2% Cost-of-Living Adjustment and a Direct Support Wage Enhancement (A5268/S4127A in their respective house budget proposal to reverse years of underfunding and address an escalating staffing crisis that is having a devastating impact on people with disabilities in need of essential support. One in five direct care positions are currently vacant across the state, and nearly 40% of providers were forced to close or reduce programs in a single year.

The Arc New York is the largest non-profit provider of supports and services for people with I/DD in the state. The phone blitz was conducted by 17 Arc Chapters the Northeast Region, including Liberty ARC. Collectively, these 17 Chapters support more than 7,000 individuals and families, and employ nearly 8,000 people in the region in their shared mission to provide people with intellectual, developmental, and other disabilities the ordinary and extraordinary opportunities of life.

“The response from the community shows how passionate people are about quality ser-

VICES for those with disabilities,” said Liberty ARC CEO Jennifer Saunders in a news release. “New York needs to continue to make a meaningful investment in the services and the staff that our family, friends, and neighbors with disabilities rely on every day. Lawmakers in Albany need to know how vital these services are for the people we support, and that our communities all benefit when every New Yorker has the support they need and the opportunities to thrive.”

“As a brother of a person who receives services from Liberty ARC and a board member of the agency, I’m proud to be fully committed to this campaign,” said Paul DiCaprio, who also serves on the Arc New York’s Board of Governors, in the release. “Funding and support from New York State can’t be pushed off to another year. The people who depend on providers like Liberty ARC need their voices heard, and so many family and friends came through with these important calls.”

“We are thrilled with the enthusiastic response from the community,” said Susan Lucas, Regional Vice President of the Board of Governors, in the release. “Thousands of voices were lifted to call on state leaders to make a commitment to support New Yorkers with disabilities. Meeting that commitment means making a meaningful investment in the services and staff they rely on for health, safety, wellbeing, integration, and opportunity.”

Winter activities at Schoharie Crossing State Historic Site

The Visitor Center and Museum may be closed for the winter season, but the grounds at Schoharie Crossing State Historic Site are open every day of the year from sunrise to sunset.

Schoharie Crossing offers over two and a half miles of level towpath trail and dozens of acres of open spaces for cross-country skiing, snow shoeing, and winter hiking.

Several historic Erie Canal structures, dating from both the original canal of the 1820s and the Enlarged Canal of the 1840s, can be seen despite snow, including the impressive remnants of the Schoharie Creek Aqueduct.

Access to our towpath trails can be found from the parking lots at our Visitor Center, 129 Schoharie Street, Fort Hunter, or from Yankee Hill Lock, 550

Queen Anne Road, Amsterdam when weather conditions allow.

Please note that Snowmobiles are prohibited on state park land at Schoharie Crossing, though the Town of Florida Snowmobile Club does maintain the C7P and C7B sections of Montgomery County trail that runs adjacent to the site. The site’s boat launch parking lot of Hartley Lane will be available for riders who wish

to trailer in for use along that approved trail when conditions allow.

This winter, Schoharie Crossing will be providing on-site as well as online programming. Follow us on Facebook or visit our NYS Parks website for event dates and details. We also offer outreach programs for a wide variety of groups such as scout troops, senior citizen organizations, histori-

cal society groups and grade school classes.

These programs can include a slide show, and some hands-on activities.
