Liberty ARC direct support professionals earn national credentials

Liberty ARC recently hosted a graduation ceremony for 22 Direct Support Professionals (DSPs), who achieved National Alliance for Direct Support Professionals (NADSP) credentials, in November. This is the agency's second credentialled class to graduate as part of the New York State Office for People With Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) credentialing pilot program.

NADSP is one of the nation's leading DSP associations, promoting excellence in direct support work. As a member of NADSP, Liberty ARC has the opportunity for our direct care staff to earn credentials through the NADSP E-Badges Academy. This is a nationally-recognized credential with different levels (DSP-I, DSP-II, DSP-III, FLS). Each E-Badge earned challenges the DSP taking the module to expand their knowledge and apply it in situations with the people they support. The coursework included a rigorous 100 hours of online classwork as well as demonstrated application of the principles learned.

"The staff we are recognizing have shown tremendous dedication to the field and the people they support by putting in many hours on the weekends, evenings, and around their busy schedules to earn these credentials," said Liberty ARC CEO Jennifer Saunders in a news release. "We all know that direct support work is multi-faceted and draws on knowledge and skills from many disciplines, as well as interpersonal skills such as empathy, compassion, and communication. We are so proud of our graduates for demonstrating these skills and willing to further their own education to better serve the people they support. They represent the best of what it means to be a direct support worker."

Liberty ARC announced their membership with NADSP and inclusion in the state-wide OPWDD Pilot Program in the winter of 2023. While Liberty ARC's first class was only open to DSPs, the agency was pleased to expand the program to frontline supervisors (FLS), including managers, so they could also receive the national certification to expand their knowledge of how to lead teams and provide the best supports to people with disabilities in 2024.

"Since I started working at Liberty ARC in 2008, there has been a huge shift in our careers. We have gone from basic caregivers to 'Direct Support Professional.' We are pushing the lines in the health care world to be accredited and certified nationally. As time advances, so does our vision for strengthening the system and advocating for each person on a level that engages them to fight for what is important to them."

Saint Kateri Shrine to host Candles & Carols service

The Saint Kateri National Shrine and Historic Site is pleased to invite the public to our Candles & Carols Service on Saturday, Dec. 7, at 4 p.m.

The Christmas crèche tradition originated with Saint Francis. He staged the first nativity scene on Christmas Eve in 1223 in a cave outside the Italian town of Greccio to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Saint Francis proclaimed the Gospel to the people of Greccio as they carried torches and candles to light the night. Then he preached to them about Jesus' humility and poverty.

The celebration, which includes singing Christmas

hymns, a gospel reading from Luke, and a meditation on the nativity by Pope Francis, will be held outside in the dark and cold to remind us of the faith Joseph and Mary had in God's desire for them and for us as His chosen children.

Grassmann Hall will be open for anyone who desires to join us in prayer and song but would prefer the heat and light.

Bring a Christmas dessert to share with the coffee and hot chocolate provided afterwards. It is recommended that you bring a flashlight.

Kateri Tekakwitha was a young Mohawk woman who

lived in the 17th century. She converted to Christianity and was baptized and lived the bulk of her life at the site of what is now the Saint Kateri National Shrine and Historic Site. She is the first Native American Saint in the United States of America and Canada, and the National Shrine was created to honor Kateri and the Native peoples north and south of the border.
