Liberty ARC recently celebrated the graduation of 16 Direct Support Professionals, who achieved National Alliance for Direct Support Professionals (NADSP) credentials as the agency's first class as part of the New York State Office for People With Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) credentialing pilot program.

NADSP is one of the nation's leading DSP associations, promoting excellence in direct support work. Liberty ARC announced their membership in NADSP and inclusion in the statewide OPWDD Pilot Program this past winter.

Assemblyman Angelo Santabarbara, Amsterdam Mayor Michael Cinquanti, and Associate Commissioner for OPWDD Alison Pingelski, and Kathy Brown from NADSP were on hand to celebrate the program graduates at an event held at Liberty ARC on July 26.

The coursework included a rigorous 100 hours of online classwork as well as demonstrated application of the principles learned.
